What size ship is the right one for you, one might ask? They range from yachtlike vessels such as The Regent Seven Seas and the Azamara from Celebrity and can get as long and large as 3 football fields such as the Princess, Carnival, Norwegian Cruise Line, and Royal Caribbean ships. You can travel with as few as 100 fellow cruisers or as many as 3,000 and with the new ships being built lately, you can travel with even a few hundred more! A good example of that are the new Freedom and the Oasis of the Seas from Royal Caribbean. Depending on your age



group, you may go for what is now commonly called in our industry a 'human-size' ship, i.e. the MSC Cruises out of Ft. Lauderdale, where corridors are much shorter and common areas quicker to get to, not to mention the fact that it enables one to make relationships much more easily. Neither will it take you as long to discover everything that is on board!

Programs on board of cruise ships abound from art exhibitions, art auctions, culinary classes, educational and enrichment seminars led by distinguished and well-known guest experts, history and financial lectures among others. But as of June 2009, no American will be allowed to travel without an official Passport. Passpor applications can be obtained from a Post-Office branch, or in one of the Courthouse Passport office.

# FROM ALL OF US AT HIPPO ROOFING HAVE A MERRY CHRISTMAS AND A HAPPY NEW YEAR





Those who celebrate Christmas know that a Christmas tree is often the centerpiece to holiday decorating and celebrating. Presents are tucked beneath the bows, and for many it's a family affair choosing and decorating the tree. While there will be debates on both sides of the fence as to whether a real or artificial tree is better, it comes down to personal preference. Each has its share of advantages and disadvantages.

The big decision lies in choosing a tree that will fit the size of your home and your lifestyle and making it safe. Consider these ideas.

Individuals with large great rooms or cathedral ceilings may be able to invest in a tree that is tall and full. A smaller tree may seem dwarfed in a large room. Conversely, those with a smaller room will want to scale back their tree size. Otherwise the tree can take up too much space and infringe on normal activities.

Placement of a tree is also important. Many people want to put the tree in front of a large window to show off their display to passers by. However, this isn't always practical. If a heating element is near to where you want to put your tree, the air can dry out a real tree; artificial trees may be more forgiving. Take care not to place a tree where it will interfere with the ability to traverse the room, or where guests, children or pets will stumble into it. In fact, those with young children or pets may want to place the tree in a corner where it will be somewhat out of the way or barricaded by other furniture. Securing the tree to a wall or the ceiling with a small hook and fishing line will also be a measure of safety.

Through the years lighting manufacturers have taken steps to create holiday lights that are safer and easier to use. It is never recommended to put real, lit candles on a tree, which is an obvious

fire hazard. Check for frayed wires or bulbs that burn relatively hot on Christmas light strands, which can also be hazardous if the lights are left on while unattended. LED lights are now available that operate cooly and may last longer than some other traditional lights.

When choosing ornaments, place delicate or breakable items higher up out of the prying hands of young children. Because glass ornaments can fall and break, it may be safer to use plastic or ceramic ones that will be more durable. A tree is something out of the ordinary in a home, so it's natural that a pet or a child will be attracted to it, hence the need to consider safety.

If you are cutting down your own tree or picking one up from the lot, another consideration is being safe with transport. Many people do not adequately secure the tree to their vehicle before driving it home. A tree that is moving back and forth on the roof of a car, or worse, comes loose and ends up on the

road, is a danger. Tie the tree from all directions so that it will not move in transit. And make sure that the branches are kept together in a mesh bag so that they do not catch wind while you are moving. Drive slowly and be attentive while making turns.

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# **CHRISTMAS CAN BE A GREAT TIME TO SHOW YOUR HOME** SPOTLIGHT ON HOUSING

#### If you're like many of today's homebuyers, you've

**probably listened to** friends', family's and coworkers' advice, many of whom may be encouraging you to buy a home. However, you may still wonder if buying a home is the right thing to do.

Family, cheer, warmth... these are some of the memories and feelings the holidays conjure up and they are, not coincidentally, the best possible feelings to create when showing your home.

Holidays offer the seller so many options for making a home perfect for the buyer: Special lights, holiday smells, cozy fireplaces, and festive decorations. Remember, though, the motto for sellers is 'stay simple.

#### Use modest lighting and decorations inside and out.

If you have a Christmas tree, consider buying one size smaller than you usually buy. Arrange a few simple gifts with matching wrapping paper under the tree. Make sure there is no extravagant display of gifts or toys under the tree. Store furniture that is displaced by the tree.

#### For all decorations, smaller and simpler is better.

Favor natural materials such as real pine branches and pine cones for wreaths and other decorations, and shun plastics or bright, big decorations. Avoid blowup decorations outside.

#### Decorate your home with fragrance.

Bake bread or cookies. If this is impossible, try light holiday fragrances such as vanilla or cinnamon. Avoid heavy pine smells.

Clean thoroughly your fireplace and make sure a small, crackling fire is going during walk-throughs.

But pay special attention to the temperature of your home. Make sure the home is lightly warm, not so toasty that potential buyers can't stand to wear their coats.

# Make sure all your window blinds and curtains are open for day showings.

This means the windows themselves must be perfectly clean.

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#### **SPOTLIGHT ON HEALTH**

The day after Thanksgiving is a milestone of sorts in America . It reminds us of just how quickly the year has gone by and how close we are to the holiday season. This realization, coupled with the fabulous sales at major department stores and malls everywhere, helps make the day after Thanksgiving our biggest shopping day of the year. And until we flip the calendar over to a new year, the chaos just doesn't let up.

Since the added demands of this season can stress the capacity of our bodies, we need to do everything we can to help ourselves by eating right, drinking plenty of water, stretching, exercising and taking a few minutes to slow down and reflect on what the season is all about.

The following are tips to help keep you and your family healthy and happy this season.

#### Treat Holiday Shopping as an Athletic Event

Stay hydrated! Drink eight to ten 8ounce glasses of water a day. (Coffee, tea, soft drinks and alcohol are diuretics/dehydrators. Don't substitute them for water.) On shopping days, you may need to drink even more water.

Be sure to stretch before and after a long day of shopping. When you are stressed-out, your muscles are less flexible than usual.

Wear shoes with plenty of cushioning in the soles to absorb the impact of walking on hard shopping mall floors. According to recent studies, 60% of women report wearing uncomfortable shoes.

Leave your purse at home. Wear a light fanny pack or a light backpack instead. Pack only those items that are absolutely essential (driver's license, credit card, etc.).

If you start to feel some pain, nip it in the bud. When you get home, apply an ice bag to the affected area for 20 minutes, then take it off for a couple of hours. Repeat a couple of times each day over the next day or two.

Plan frequent breaks into your shopping day. During a day of heavy shopping, most healthy people should take a break every 45 minutes. Those with less stamina may even need to



take a break every 20-30 minutes.

#### Wrapping Your Gifts

Since there is no "ideal" position for wrapping gifts, the most important thing to remember is to vary your positions. For

example, try standing at a table or countertop for one package, sitting on a bed for another, sitting in a comfortable chair for another, etc.

Do not wrap packages while sitting on a hard floor. This can wreak havoc on your posture.

Always stretch before and after you wrap gifts. It is a good idea to "stretch the opposites". In other words, if you are leaning forward when wrapping your gifts, stretch backward when you are done.

# maintaining HOLIDAY TRADITIONS

#### For many families, the holidays are all about tradition. Traditions can include annual trips to Grandma's house,

when and where a family shares its holiday gifts, or something as simple as the holiday meal.

With the nation's economy in flux, however, some family traditions could be facing extinction. For those who aren't the cream of the culinary crop, there are a host of cookbooks or online recipes that offer easy and step-by-step directions to cooking a host of holiday meal favorites. Once you've cooked your own family meal, you might be surprised at how easy it was and how much money you've saved.

Change your schedule. Lots of families find the chance to gather with extended family and friends the true joy of the holiday season. However, with fuel costs still high, driving or flying to see relatives might fall by the wayside as families look to save some money.

One way to counter the costs of holiday traveling is to travel on days that aren't traditional travel days. This can prove especially prudent when flying, as airlines often charge far less if travelers are more flexible and willing to fly on off-peak dates. While you might not be able to spend the holiday itself with family and friends, you should still be able to spend some time around the holidays with family and friends, and save lots of money in the process.

> Another way chanaina your schedule can save you money is if you get together with family and friends and choose to meet in a neutral setting that's more amenable to everyone. For example, rather than one family traveling 200 miles to visit relatives, ease the burden on both ends by agreeing to meet at a halfway point. There, you can sit down and enjoy a good meal, spend the day together, and share the financial burden of traveling, rather than placing that burden all on one family.

Be flexible. Because kids often get at least a week off from school during the holiday season, many families choose to take mini vacations during this time of year. But the state of the economy might make that tradition harder to keep this holiday season.

In such instances, it helps to be as flexible as possible. For instance, if a tradition involves a week or weekend at your favorite ski resort, you don't necessarily need to squash that tradition entirely. Rather, consider scaling it down. Choose a closer resort if possible, and rather than spending the night, make it a day trip. If you're used to spending an entire week, save money by scaling it back to just a couple of days, and choose the days in the middle of the week, when resorts typically lower rates in an effort to attract more customers.

Use turkey sausage instead of pork or a combination of your favorite cheeses. They may be called "Breakfast Casseroles" but they are good any time of day. # Breakfast Casseroles

8 oz. Pillsbury Reduced Fat Crescent Rolls
6-7 slices of thickly sliced swiss cheese (enough to cover crust)
4 eggs
3/4 cup milk
2 Tbsp dried onion or minced fresh onion
6 slices bacon (fried and crumbled)
salt and pepper parsley for garnish
Separate and press crescent dough into a lightly greased 13" x 9" pan. Press into bottom and 1" up each side of pan. Place cheese slices over the dough. In a small bowl,

combine the eggs, milk salt and pepper. Pour over cheese slices. Sprinkle with bacon. Cover loosely with tin foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until done. Garnish with parsley.



1 lb. pork sausage 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese 1 bunch of green onions, chopped 3 cups milk 1 1/2 cups Bisquick mix 6 eggs salt and pepper to taste Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Brown sausage and onions, drain. Using a mixer or blender, mix eggs, milk, and Bisquick. Layer the following in a 13"x9" pan: sausage and onions; shredded cheese; milk mixture. Bake for 35-40 minutes until brown and set. Serve with fresh fruit in compote and bread/muffin.

Both Serves 6-8 people.

Believe it or not, saving a few hundred dollars each month doesn't require life-altering steps. There are certain habits to which you may have grown accustomed that could be eating away money. Here are some ways you can start saving immediately.

**1. Skip the ATM.** ATMs that are outside of your banking network may impose a charge for every withdrawal you make. If you take out money a few times a week every month, it can

add up. If you withdraw on average four times per week with a service fee of \$2, that's \$416 for the 52 weeks in a year on ATMs alone. Instead, use ATMs that don't charge fees. Better yet, take out a specific budgeted amount from inside the bank (where no fees are incurred). This way you don't overspend, either.

**2. Pay bills online.** You can have almost every major bill directly withdrawn from your checking account these days. Having payments automatically made eliminates any late fees added to your account for paying bills late. Plus, you don't have to pay for postage.



3. Shop discount

stores. Many discount merchants offer quality, and even name-brand merchandise for a fraction of the cost of other department stores. They just may be season's leftovers. Also, consider renting instead of purchasing bigticket items. For example, for those who have to

attend a wedding or other party, you can rent a tuxedo or party dress instead of splurging on an outfit you're probably only going to wear once.

**4. Carpool.** Let's face it, no matter how much gasoline prices go up or down, it's much more cost-effective to carpool and split all costs. Also, switching up vehicles means less wear and tear on one particular car.

**5. Pay with cash.** By putting purchases on a credit card you run the risk of overspending, and in turn having to pay financing fees. Cut down on credit card usage and you could see more money in your savings

In the past year it has become increasingly difficult to find a new computer with anything but Windows

**Vista installed.** Many people believe that Windows XP is no longer available. This is true for many large retailers and online vendors but Windows XP is still alive and well for a little longer at smaller system builders.

In 20 years of Microsoft operating systems, no transition has created as much public contention as what we are seeing with Windows Vista. The closest thing that I can equate to it is the release of Windows ME, which was arguably the worst version of Windows ever committed to disk, but the difference was that users weren't forced to migrate to it. Most

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users went from Windows 98 Second Edition to Windows 2000 or XP and skipped right over the "Millennium Edition" because of the problems that were associated with it.

The reality of Windows Vista is that it is somewhat more stable and more secure than Windows XP, but it looks and works differently and is requires more computing horsepower to run. In addition there are still many applications that don't exactly work in harmony with Vista. This current situation clearly shows that Microsoft failed to "build a better mouse trap" with Vista.

The dissenting vocalization from the four corners of the Internet caused Microsoft to delay the demise of Windows XP somewhat, but alas,

> the end is nigh. June 30th marked the end of the line for major retailers and major manufacturers to acquire product for sale in their stores or through their websites.

It is still possible to buy new computers with XP from custom system builders like Data Doctors. You can also purchase a system with Vista Business or Ultimate and downgrade it to XP Professional.

Here are the currently published timelines and associated events for Windows XP (all subject to change!):



**June 30, 2008** *PC manufacturers* and retailers stop selling computers with *XP* installed.

January 31, 2009 Microsoft stops selling Windows XP.

**April 14, 2009** Mainstream support ends. Microsoft will continue to provide security fixes.

January 31, 2009 Downgrade program from Vista Business and Ultimate to XP Pro ends

**April 8, 2014** All support for Windows XP ends.

Here's the bottom line: You will be able to purchase some form of a computer with Windows XP preloaded on it until January 31st of 2009, however, starting on July 1st, 2008 it will become increasingly more difficult and more expensive because your options will narrow.

### **EXTRAVAGANT GIFTS**

In June 2006, Roman Abramovich presented his friend, Eugene Shvidler, with a remarkably lavish gift. Le Grand Bleu, which has been docked at Port Canaveral since October 19th, is one of the world's largest private yachts. It was built in 2000 and had been owned by Abramovich for four years when he presented it to Shvidler. The ship is 370 feet long and powered by two 3600 horse power engines.
